Hub Master 2022 in Edmonton | Canada

AFTER A TWO-YEAR PAUSE BROUGHT ON BY THE PANDEMIC, OUR INTERNATIONAL PELIKAN HUB TOOK PLACE AGAIN IN 2022. THERE WERE MORE ATTENDEES THAN EVER BEFORE – 6,138 WORLDWIDE – SHOWING THAT FANS OF HANDWRITING WANT TO MEET EACH OTHER AND TALK IN PERSON.

HE GAVE US A LOOK INTO HIS PERSONAL HUB DIARY ...

### MONDAY | AUGUST 8

Saw on the Pelikan Hubs Facebook page that the 2022 Hubs are being held in person again and that registration is open. I signed up quickly and recommended Edmonton to be a Hub city. I also said that I was willing to be the Hub master. It was daunting as well as fun when I did it the first time ... though if I were to be chosen this time, I'd have a better idea of everything I'd do as Hub master.

### SECOND ENTRY

Just received my registration confirmation e-mail for 2022.

### FRIDAY | AUGUST 26

I just found out in an e-mail that I'm the Hub master for the local Hub in Edmonton this year! I know this means many hours of organizing, e-mailing, and looking for a venue, but experience tells me that it doesn't have to take up a huge amount of time.

We have a city-wide fountain pen community, so I'll get in touch with one of the local art supply and stationery stores that have a central studio space for art courses ...

They were fantastic for us fans during a Hub in the past and have a central, easy-to-access location. Let's see ... If these stores can't make it happen, it'll be a bigger challenge to find another central location offering enough space, light, and maybe something to eat – all while not expecting any fees or major food and beverage orders in return for organizing the event. Nonetheless, it's a big stroke of luck that we have a range of options.

### TUESDAY | AUGUST 30

Took a look at the local art supply and stationery store. Spoke with the owner as well – she's willing to host the Hub again this year! She asked if one of this year's attendees ➤

was my wife ... apparently someone who was "interested" had come by the same day and chatted about the Hub. That means they had sent out feelers to see if the store would be willing to host us again. Our local fountain pen community has a lot of great people with the same great ideas.

### FRIDAY | SEPTEMBER 2

Just got the list of attendees. Huge potential. It might even be the largest Hub Edmonton has ever seen! Making an e-mail list and writing to all attendees soon.

### **SUNDAY | SEPTEMBER 11**

The initial e-mail to the attendees has been sent out ... I outlined the venue and the amenities of the neighborhood, mentioned the latest COVID precautions, and asked for feedback if anyone had any concerns.

It's a Pelikan event, but I still reminded the fans that they can bring along anything from their collections that they want to show. There'll be many Pelikans, though also a few other fountain pens that are unique, rare, or downright breathtaking! Our Hub in Edmonton is one of the few occasions there are to meet up and see these gems. I've suggested an ink swap and a joint writing session, and asked if anyone can contribute some material for this part of the Hub, like jars, pipettes, paper, and so on.

### MONDAY | SEPTEMBER 12

One of the local fountain pen enthusiasts (dare I say a fanatic) sent a message saying that he'll donate a bit to our ink swap. He has his own online store for ink samples, accessories, and unique pens. I'll bring recycled sugarcane paper, which the ink shimmers very nicely on. Not sure what Pelikan will supply; they gave us notepads in the past. I think we'll have plenty of supplies.

### **SEPTEMBER | FURTHER POSTS**

A lot of positive feedback! The attendees are happy with the choice of venue; they're exchanging ideas about how to make this Hub even better. A few additional guests are coming, too!

### MONDAY | OCTOBER 17

I've just learned that the Pelikan Hub box has been sent out. Some of the other Hub masters are saying in the group chat that there are no free jars of the Ink of the Year and no Edelstein sampler set this time. There are still notepads, name tags, waterproof pens, and the flag for the Pelikan Hub, though.

Sent an e-mail update to the attendees and told them about the lack of ink and how I'll provide the leftovers of an Edelstein sampler set from an earlier Hub since I've been a Hub master before. This will let the attendees sample the inks. Overall, we're pretty well prepared.

### TUESDAY | NOVEMBER 15

I'm still communicating with the attendees and finding out at the last minute who can come and who has to cancel. Our local fountain pen superfan has asked about the final numbers ... apparently he wants to split up a jar of Apatite Edelstein into small samples for all attendees. Did I mention already that we truly have a great, local fountain pen community? I'll get a few snacks, drinks, and plastic tablecloths to decorate our meeting - and protect surfaces against "uncontrolled" releases of ink. >

### FRIDAY | NOVEMBER 18

Today was Hub day! I arrived at our room about an hour before the event to prepare everything. The owner was extremely nice and showed me where everything was and what I needed to watch out for.



# HUB day

I put the tables together to make islands of two tables so we had lots of space for writing and for the accessories. I also wanted to ensure some distance for anyone who was still cautious about COVID. I covered the tables with white plastic tablecloths. Because the room was a large art space, we didn't have to worry much (spilled ink would just add to the color), however I still wanted to leave as few "marks" as possible.

I put a sign-in table at the entrance, the Edelstein ink samples at the front as well, and the snacks to the side. The fans were able to come in, sign in, sign the flag (while getting a name tag), and hang up their coats. They got a copy of the

Pelikan customer magazine "Passion," their Pelikan notepad, and a sample of the Apatite ink. The people were able to choose their own seats for the evening. Unfortunately, we didn't have a projector, so I brought along multiple printed copies of the Pelikan presentation for the attendees to read through at their leisure.

When most people had arrived, I took a few minutes to welcome everyone to the Edmonton Hub. I paid tribute to Pelikan and the efforts made to hold Hubs in person again during the pandemic. After that, I informed the attendees about the setup of the space, praised the owner of the venue, and announced that she was going to serve us a few treats a bit later. I especially thanked our superfan, who had sacrificed a jar of Apatite so that we could all get a sample. I also emphasized the international flair of the global event and that we could boast about being the most northern Hub in North America to participate.

Afterward, I let everyone go so that they could do what they were all here for ... enjoy the company of other fountain pen devotees, chat about pens, nibs, inks, and paper; swap, and pour out their hearts to each other.

I think I even tempted someone with a new fountain pen to draw him even further into our "rabbit hole" of pens and ink. I can barely wait for next year! •

# PERSONAL

MY NAME IS GERARDO MONTES, I'M 39, AN INDUSTRIAL DESIGNER IN THE LOGISTICS SECTOR, AND LIVE IN URUAPAN, MEXICO. WHY AM I A 100 PERCENT PELIKAN FAN? Even as a child, I was interested in the fountain pens in my father's antiques drawer. My grandmother always wrote in an old notebook, using beautiful ink. She taught me the Palmer Method, a form of the Latin script and an instructional method for learning handwriting. I discovered the immense variety of Pelikan a few years ago and fell in love with the Classic M 205 Star Ruby. Its design, the incredibly smooth writing experience, and its striking performance amazed me. When it catches the sun, a ruby-hued crystal bursts in my hand and the color red flashes brilliantly; I become completely hypnotized by this glow. The Edelstein inks and their astounding color experience are fantastic – Star Ruby gives me a magical feeling when I write. I enter another world, a peaceful one where I can relax.

I'm crazy about Pelikan writing instruments, especially the 200 series. It's the perfect balance of price, fantastic design, materials, and breathtaking colors. My collection at the moment: M 205 Star Ruby, M 200 Golden Beryl, M 205 Green-Marbled, M 205 DUO Yellow, and M 205 Apatite. I'm passionate about using them; I feel as if they invite me to keep on writing. I celebrate handwriting, especially in our modern, technical world.

# INTHUSIAS

An engine behind our passion

Where does enthusiasm really come from?
Is it something we're born with or can it be learned?
It's good to know that just our view of the world can set a lot in motion and even ignite our passion.
This is a thought that enthuses us to no end – and makes us joyously excited!

### WHERE DOES ENTHUSIASM COME FROM?

Anything that spreads joy is certain to feel good. We enjoy the feeling of experiencing something great or solving exciting tasks. It fills us with energy, as if we could tear trees from their roots. However, this feeling of happiness and thirst for action come from another place than you might imagine, as it is not external factors that put us in high spirits. Rather, the ability to be enthused always comes from within ourselves and has an intrinsic motivation behind it. The things that personally interest us, give us purpose, and are fun to us are factors that drive and motivate us.

### CAN ENTHUSIASM BE LEARNED?

The story behind urban sketching is a story of connections. It is a meeting of the analog and the digital, of profession and hobby, of tools and stylized forms, and of meeting and sharing. Above all, though, it is a story that connects people all over the globe through art.

At the beginning, illustrator and journalist Gabriel Campanario would definitely never have imagined how many people his idea would turn into Urban Sketchers over the next one and a half decades. A short trip back in time: The year is 2007. A year when microblogs enabled access to global publications and social media was gaining relevance. Gabriel Campanario started an online forum. It was aimed at "All sketchers out there who love sketching the cities they live in and visit, from their home's window, from a café, from a park, standing on a street corner ... always at the location and not from a photo or memory." In 2008, just one year later, the Urban Sketchers blog was born. It showed sketches and stories from a group of invited artists, later becoming the foundation for the global movement. Today it has more than 120,000 members in over 60 countries and 394 cities.

#### THE FEELING OF THE MOMENT

Urban sketching is more than sketching technique, strokes of ink, and color. It is a form of documentation, a translation of an individual observation — when a personal experience of a moment is captured using your own hands and a variety of instruments such as a fountain pen, ink, and pad, or a pen and tablet, and becomes a story: the flow that is created when sketching takes on its own dynamic based on the moment. The process becomes an end point in itself, and the sketch an unmistakable memory just a short while later.

During the sketching process, there are a few guidelines to help the global community and they can be found written in the manifesto, a code that sets out a vision and values. For instance, it says that sketchers draw on location, indoors or out, capturing what they see from direct observation. It also says, "We use any kind of media and cherish our individual styles." This all contributes to one goal: Urban Sketchers, as a community, helps to raise artistic, storytelling, and educational value.

#### HEAD OUT, SKETCH, SHOW,

Seeing the world, one sketch after another. In the endless sketchbook on the internet, works are made visible with hashtags such as #urbansketchers and #usk. Gigantic metropolis skylines make a big impression, as do the architectural building styles and impressions of nature that are sketched on paper with great attention to detail. The focus is not so much on the materials that are used or on there being a certain level of talent. It is about letting everyone be creative.

Sketching brings people together at an unimaginable variety of locations locally and globally. There is a regular, global symposium as well as individual chapters organized by volunteers. At them, the Urban Sketchers share their sketching knowledge, meet for sketching walks, and show off their sketches. There are currently 15 chapters in Germany, with most being active in large cities.

It is also possible to be part of the movement without joining a local chapter. What does it take? Not much. Simply launch into it and start with the Urban Sketchers criteria. There is no age limit. Beginners, hobby artists, and professionals, all are welcome and anyone is allowed to sketch and share their own way. A tip: Take some photos of the work while still on site and publish them later.

#### THE BEGINNINGS

The time was shortly before Christmas 2020 and the second COVID-19 lockdown had brought life outside home to a standstill. Florian Zietz was a senior art director at an agency in Hamburg, where he still develops packaging designs to this day. On Instagram, he learned about the major project by New York's Brooklyn Art Library — and the friend who sent this link to the sketching fan did not have any idea what she had set in motion. Zietz was so fascinated that he launched sketchbook.hamburg within just a few weeks. His side art project is participatory by nature and has been devoted to writing, sketching, gluing, collaging, and the personal stories behind this since the start.

#### ALL HANDMADE

The passionate designer created the company logo and logo stamp, folded A3 sheets for the sketchbooks, cut the paper to postcard size so it could be taken everywhere, and stitched together ten copies using his wife's sewing machine. He gave away the first few sketchbooks to friends and neighbors, who filled the blank pages with ink, paint, glued-on paper, and other materials and agreed to have their diverse and moving pictures, texts, and stories published.

In early 2021, the first filled-in sketchbooks went online and there are now about 150 copies that can be marveled at online. The proud founder presents the originals at on-site exhibitions, for which he punches a hole on



the top edge of the 32-page books so they can be hung up and leafed through. The personal interactions and direct communication with visitors and artists are very important to Florian Zietz.

Each individual sketchbook is still handmade today. Anyone wishing to fill in one themselves can order an empty copy for 25 euros, let their fantasy run wild, and send it back to Florian Zietz, who shares the impressive works with many people around the world.

# SIGNS With SOUL

FROM NEON SIGNS TO INTERIOR DESIGN





Working with glass, one of humanity's oldest and most fascinating materials, is a true calling for the experts at neon sign maker Goodwin & Goodwin. Viviane & Paul Goodwin are the CEOs of the company, which has existed since 2009. Their neon maker Paul Charlton applies his 30 years of experience in this traditional craft, and together they inspire their customers. They employ about 20 talented craftspeople with decades of experience and, by putting in a lot of time, patience, and extraordinary ability, they produce signs out of tubular glass with an impressive glow.

Having the best materials and highest standards is fundamental to what they do. This is deeply appreciated by their clients, who include international corporate clients as well as highly regarded artists in other industries, such as musicians Rita Ora and Ed Sheeran. Close collaboration with the clients during the production process provides the foundation for bringing the client's idea to life. The neon glass benders always combine their craft with an artistic aspect – and, adding their deep passion for the vocation, they ultimately create prime examples of craftsmanship.

The glass bending process requires not only patience, but also five years of practice until the craftsman or craftswoman can make even the simplest of shapes. The tubular glass is heated and bent during production until it meets the requirements. Electrodes are applied and the sealed points heated under vacuum. Lastly, the tubes are filled with noble gas — known colloquially as neon — and sealed up permanently. It is a complicated production process that demands lots of expertise.

While the London-based sign makers cannot produce all colors, they most certainly have a great selection on offer for their glass tubes. With neon lettering, it is the design above all else that determines what tones look good

together or not. The craftspeople also realize complicated orders that other companies refuse to do because of their difficulty. Their motto is to "go the extra mile and ensure that our clients' expectations are exceeded."

The company, which is among the last 30 of its kind remaining in the UK, has outstanding works of art that enjoy global fame. Moreover, it also receives many orders from the local region as neon lettering is a sensitive product for short delivery distances. Goodwin & Goodwin has received numerous design and handwork awards over the years. They serve as a testament to the dedication that they apply to their work.

The long-lasting light-up signs are available from a price of 500 euros, depending on size and complexity. If they are larger and have more detail, a piece may even cost more than 10,000 euros. The installation method and location are further factors in the pricing and must be finalized when the order is given.

The traditional craft of neon glass bending started in 1910 when French engineer Georges Claude invented the neon light. The first neon advertisement was sold to a Parisian hairdresser two years later. Since then, colorful advertising materials have brightened up towns and cities across the world. Attractions such as New York's Times Square achieved significantly larger renown through them. It is uncertain how long the handmade neon advertising from north London will continue to exist. Glass bending is an occupation that is dying off and has been listed as a heritage craft.

Meanwhile, modern technology is also threatening glass bending, with LED advertisements being a major competitor in the market. Nonetheless, neon continues to be a trend and has never been out of fashion, the company's directors say. Its usage, however, has changed. Background lighting in the signs is less prominent and in return they are being used more frequently in boutiques, artistic spaces, and living areas. Lettering made of neon



glass is used when this lettering is intended to be exquisite and particularly prestigious. In the eyes of Viviane and Paul, there will never be a perfect replacement for neon. They agree that "the unique 360-degree lighting and the traditional craftsmanship inspire us. We breathe soul into our signs, which makes our designs unique." •



# LINES THAT BECOME UNIQUE ARTWORKS.

WITH ARTIST MANUEL SKIRL

ERVIEW

Manuel Skirl, aged 33 and from Vienna, is a self-taught artist who gained renown with his multiline technique. He is a trained metal engraver and used to express himself graphically through graffiti, even as an adolescent. An arm injury sustained while tagging a few years ago put him on a new path a multilined one.



# WHAT CAPTIVATES AND INSPIRES YOU? IS IT NATURE OR ARCHITECTURE? OR DO YOUR LINES SIMPLY FLOW FROM WITHIN YOU?

I draw enthusiasm most of all from natural structures, particularly tree bark. Organic structures and plants, whether in nature itself or in a room, always inspire me. A fascination for letters and a desire for design and expression have also been recurring themes throughout my life. I illustrate the things that surround me and occupy me, the things that flow naturally from my hand. However, I'm also a person of my times, so the present day inspires my work, too, and in my pictures I draw what is coursing through me and entering my flow at the time.

# YOU USED TO BE A GRAFFITI ARTIST AND NOW YOUR WORK IS MAINLY MONOCHROME. DID THAT DEVELOP BY ITSELF OR DID YOU DECIDE THAT?

I had an injury, so I changed from tagging graffiti to painting – which was not a conscious decision, but more of a natural development. At the same time, I focused a lot on design and color theory. I looked closely at the effects of complementary colors and colors in general. Colors can stimulate our hormones and the knowledge out there on color theory is highly interesting. As a result, I reduced my use of color and ended up using gray, blue, black, and white. The form should speak for itself.

### **HOW DID YOU DEVELOP THIS UNIQUE STRIPE TECHNIQUE?**

The multiline technique has been applied in Japanese zen gardens for ages; it has a calming effect. You draw the lines in the morning and then feel good the rest of the day. These structures stand out for me in tree bark especially. I researched and found out that they can be illustrated particularly well using the multiline tools.

### DOES THE NUMBER OF STRIPES MEAN **ANYTHING FOR YOUR MULTILINE TOOLS?**

No, the number does not mean anything, though I have noticed that my detail is becoming more intricate. I used to end up with 15 lines in the wide tips of my marker pens, whereas now I end up with 25.

### THE TECHNIQUE YOU USE IS UNFORGIV-ING. EACH STROKE NEEDS TO BE PERFECT, **ALTHOUGH THEY SEEM CALMING WHEN PUT** TOGETHER. ARE LOOKS DECEIVING?

As a person, I'm generally quite antsy and impatient. When I work, the lines flow from within me and provide a moment of respite. Smaller paintings can be more forgiving if I make a mistake, purely because I start a new painting if I am not satisfied. On large areas, I need to concentrate and collect myself before I can get started. I never liked having to fix up pictures or apply a layer of paint on top of another. Sticking rigidly to a specific design is not my approach.

#### WHAT COLORS DO YOU USE?

It depends on the surface, though there are only four colors that I ever use. I use ordinary products from the store, often acrylic paint or ink, from different companies and with highgrade pigmentation and long color retention. I condition the drawing tools, and every roll and tip is made individually by me.

### IS A "LARGE OPEN SPACE" A CHALLENGE?

It's not an issue for me! I'm a professional artist and have trained myself to be able to paint even in the rather rare moments that I can't feel my flow. In those moments, I deliberately tune out, shut off my conscious thinking, and switch to autopilot. Viewed from the outside, the end result doesn't look any different from my other works. While internally I might not be satisfied, it will still be a very good picture and observers won't notice a thing. As a professional artist, it doesn't stress me out any more than it did before, either. I'll paint a new picture if I don't like the current one; this is very normal.

# WHAT'S DIFFERENT ABOUT THE DRAWING FLOW WHEN YOU ARE BEING PHYSICALLY HOISTED ACROSS A PICTURE INSTEAD OF LOOKING AT IT ON AN EASEL?

It's completely different. Beforehand, I'll think up a concept that needs to work in every situation. It also takes significantly longer if I can't reach every part by myself and instead have to be hoisted in front of the wall. I can finish an A3 size painting in five to seven minutes. Painting a wall area of 100 square meters takes two to three days.


### WOULD YOU LIKE TO DO SCULPTING YOURSELF AND CREATE THE BODY OR SURFACE FOR YOUR DRAWINGS?

Yes, and I'm very interested in the Sgraffito technique for

that! It's a method of scratching through a surface that has its origins in antiquity. Multiple layers of colored plaster and paints are applied to a moistened surface and ornamental or geometric patterns scratched in using scrapers, nails, and carving tools. These days, the technique is used on house surfaces, for example. I definitely think I'll develop toward 3D, it interests me a lot!

# WHETHER ON PAPER, T-SHIRTS, HOUSE GABLES, OR A STREETBALL COURT: YOU ELEVATE THE EVERYDAY INTO A WORK OF ART.

Artists do a lot of thinking and I don't like that art often doesn't have a benefit of its own. I like the idea of using art to



# DO STAMP-SIZED PICTURES STAND A CHANCE WITH YOU? COULD YOU MAKE A BRUSH OR COMB TO SUIT THEM?

That's a nice idea, it's certainly possible! I don't have any demands regarding the size of a picture. Maybe you could stick together balls from ballpoint pens ... No, that would be too big. This question brings out the engraver in me, which is a delicate job, too. I'd definitely think of something, in any case!


### YOUR STYLE IS CONSIDERED VERY INFLUEN-TIAL. WOULD YOU LIKE TO DO SOME INCOG-NITO WORK AND EXPLORE NEW DIRECTIONS?

No. We street artists, and all artists, are exhibitionists. We're always happy when people notice our work. I'll still definitely keep developing.

### WHERE CAN PEOPLE SEE YOUR ART?

It's very nice when people contact me directly and ask where they can currently see pictures of mine in public spaces. I take part in street art festivals during summer, after which my contributions are painted over or cleared away. They can't be seen again after this. Art in public spaces is transitory. Even exhibitions are temporary. I have an Instagram profile where I show current pictures and shots of my work. A building owner in Vienna, on Siebensterngasse in District 7, has made his façade an open space for artists. My work can be seen on it until the next person paints over it. •

POSTER COMPETITION 1898/99 The symbiosis of art and commerce was a masterstroke by Fritz Beindorff. The then owner of the Pelikan company organized the first competition to design advertising posters 125 years ago. The passionate art collector was one of the first industrialists who sought to collaborate with artists. As the years passed, he continued initiating poster competitions. Highly regarded artists of the 1920s avant-garde influenced the Pelikan advertising graphics, with work by El Lissitzky and Kurt Schwitters being part of the illustrious collection.

In 2017, the art received a new forum within the Pelikan world at "re:pelikan." With this design-oriented

exhibition, we celebrated the opening of the TintenTurm ("ink tower"), for which

students from Hanover University of Applied Sciences and Arts reinterpreted historic Pelikan advertising posters. Poster competitions still take place often. The rotating exhibitions at the TintenTurm are very popular among people interested in art.

A quick Google search shows if handwriting truly makes you smart or not. All the same, we live with a keyboard on our desks and phone in our hand, both of which bring us to our desired sources very cleverly. We press a letter on a key and the world gets explained to us within seconds. Yet obtaining information rapidly through the keyboard is no substitute for handwriting. Though it may take longer, it is what lets us produce information, and that is because numerous neuroscience studies show that handwriting really does make you smarter - and, most importantly, happier. It even leaves a trail, so let's team together and go on the hunt after it!

THE BRAIN WHY IS HANDWRITING SO IMPORTANT FOR LEARNING?

Writing on paper with a writing instrument trains the mind. When we write, our brain's synapses communicate, connect nerve cells, and transfer information. It is a demanding activity for our internal CPU, especially as a connection is made between the left and right sides of the brain – meaning that analytical thinking has to mingle with the emotional side. Our mind benefits from this interaction. We learn more and for longer, and handwriting even helps us to improve our speech and stay mentally active.

Have you ever watched a child practice handwriting? Handwriting activates 12 parts of the brain, over 30 muscles, and roughly 17 joints. This complex operation demands a great deal of concentration and also hones motor skills and memory. When we write a word on paper, it leaves a trail in our memory that we can still access even years later. We can recall not only the word, but also the situation in which we wrote it as well as feelings, moods, and experiences. Handwriting is an engine for thinking and processing; for understanding, abstracting, and learning; and for speaking.

IS HANDWRIT-ING MORE THAN JUST WORDS?

DOES HAND-WRITING HELP WITH MENTAL CHAOS?

Often, there are so many thoughts circling in our head that we are left unable to think and act in a structured way. Jotting down thoughts, writing out what's on our mind, or writing up a prioritized to-do list creates clarity and structure. Writing not only coaxes our thoughts out of a humming mind, but also helps us to relax and solve problems more successfully. People who have cursive handwriting have been found to be more successful at learning.<sup>1</sup> Finding freedom through writing and adding order to chaos also enables us to absorb new things. It seems that we could learn a lot from our handwriting.

The fun comes from all our enthusiasm for writing directly on paper! We can hold space for our feelings, let our creativity flow, let our mind run free, sketch out a wild idea, concentrate all our energy in one direction, and get to know new people. We can discover how we create something special and personal with every word and sentence. Writing has a positive effect on us. It is something highly personal and we can take it into our own hands to make something out of it. You can be sure it will touch the heart, too – in the best way possible!
